### *ZooBorns*, written by Andrew Bleiman and Chris Eastland, published in 2010 by Simon & Schuster.

You see, [ZooBorns](#) does exactly what it sounds like: it "showcases the newest and cutest animal babies from accredited zoos and aquariums around the world." One of the creators of the blog, Andrew Bleiman, calls himself an animal nerd. Sure, there are [lots of adorable animals featured on the blog](#) and in the book, but it's done to focus attention on wildlife preservation and animal conservation. The cute fuzzies (and scabies and featheries) are a bonus. Adorable animals presented for educational purposes? Yes, please.
