It begins with a lovingly extended description of the Royal Victoria Military Hospital as it rose along the estuary shore at Netley, near Southampton. The building was a quarter of a mile long; 1m bricks were used; the facade was hundreds of windows across; it was then the biggest hospital ever constructed.
